PROGRAM OVERVIEW

In 2020-21, the Community School Collaborative (CSC) once again brought innovative educational activities to Sleeping Giant Middle School (SGMS). As educators and students alike entered the 2020-21 school year it was uncertain what kind of programming could be offered to students, but CSC was able to accomplish moving the program forward by creating innovative, safe and interactive Cougar Friday Clubs. The CSC Board experimented with different programming formats for students, initially delivering virtual clubs which later evolved into in-person clubs as the year progressed. Working closely with the school nurse and administration, these clubs gave the students activities to look forward to and provided the opportunity for SGMS youth to interact safely with peers and adults from their community. Field trips were out but fun was in during such a challenging year.

In addition, the CSC Board formally continued their ongoing relationship with the Livingston Schools by signing a Memorandum of Understanding for the third year in a row. This agreement reflects a unique tradition of cooperation between the Community School Collaborative, a non-profit organization, and the Livingston School District. The MOU's explicit intent is to enrich SGMS students' educational experiences as well as enhance their social and emotional development by engaging the talents, skills and knowledge of community members and organizations. In the MOU this year, Livingston School District employee Stephanie Clewis was identified as the liaison between the District and the CSC. Stephanie was paid by the CSC for her time and was instrumental in the success of the Cougar Friday Clubs in 2020-21.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Although the Community School Collaborative operated on a smaller scale during the 2020-21 school year, the organization was proud to deliver 28 separate Cougar Friday Clubs that met a total of 59 times. Clubs met on Fridays when school was not in-person. Sign-up was voluntary with total club enrollment exceeding 250 students. Fifty-three community volunteers led the clubs and donated a total of 245 hours of time to make Cougar Friday Clubs a reality. Over 1500 of inkind hours were donated by the CSC Board for program management and administration this fiscal year as well.



COMMUNITY EVENTS

The Community School Collaborative participated in the Park County Community Foundation's Give-a-Hoot Campaign in 2020. It was exciting to see individuals give during such an unusual and uncertain season. Despite the lack of personal donor contact, the CSC raised \$24,135 during the Give-A-Hoot! Thanks go out to PCCF and the many generous donors who supported CSC and ultimately the SGMS students.

PROGRAMMING - COUGAR FRIDAY CLUBS

Cougar Friday Clubs were the backbone of the CSC's programming in 2020-21. The following courses were offered with the assistance of community partnerships:

- Acting Up: Students discover the joy of acting by learning improv, clowning, monologues and performing in short plays.
- Amazing Anime: Students discover anime art by working on anime skill-structure and by developing an anime character and storyline.
- Art Spark: Students design, build and paint beautiful paper-mache animal heads.
- Carter's Bridge Bike Ride: Students ride to the Yellowstone River, throw and skip stones, have lunch and ride back to SGMS.
- **Chopped I, II, III:** Students hone their cooking skills and learn to cook healthy recipes using many novel garden-fish ingredients.
- Creative Confections: Students learn baking skills and bring valentine treats to their friends and family.
- **Dancing with the Broadway Stars:** Students discover engaging jazz dance moves, stage presence techniques and dance choreography.
- Drone Mania: Students explore drone technology and learn to fly several different types of drones.
- Explorer's Club: Students virtually travel the US and learn about the music, culture and food of four distinct regions of our nation.
- Fish Tails: Students discover stream entomology, learn to tie flies, and cast a fly rod.
- **Football Fanatics:** Students learn football fundamentals, drills and skills, and play a fast-paced game of flag football with high school football players.
- **Gardens and Greenhouses:** Students learn gardening basics by planting in the SGMS school garden while learning about soil quality, companion plants and direct seeding vs transplanting.
- Gelli Art: Students create original artworks using a unique printmaking technique called gel printing.
- **Get Your Game On I, II:** Students have fun playing a variety of board and card games, and develop interpersonal skills, hone fine motor skills (shuffle cards), practice counting skills and learn game technology.
- **Go Green Initiative:** Students learn the ins and outs of sustainability and the environment in a fun club run by Park High School Green Initiative Students.
- **Hoops Group:** Kids shoot hoops and learn new basketball drills and skills with Park High Basketball Coach Neibauer and SGMS Coach Schad.
- **Keep Calm and Yoga On:** Students discover the mind-body connection by learning common yoga poses, breathing exercises and relaxation techniques.
- **Know Your Snow:** Students discover the joy of snowshoeing while learning outdoor survival techniques, avalanche awareness and snow science.
- **Mystery Medicine:** Students learn about both human and canine anatomy and injuries and receive instruction in sports and wilderness medicine and stress reduction techniques.
- Of Swords and Shakespeare: Students experience the art of storytelling through stage combat, while deconstructing a scene from Romeo and Juliet.
- Outdoor Investigators: Students investigate predator-prey relationships through field observations and engage in fun science experiments.
- Robotics Club: Students design, program, build and operate robots.
- **Senior Sweetheart:** Students connect with their community when they make hand-made valentines and write to senior citizen pen pals.
- Trail Blazers Bike Club: Students learn bike safety and maintenance skills and explore their community riding the Livingston trails.

INSTRUCTOR SUPPORT AND TEAM BUILDING

Instructor support and team building were extremely challenging due to the pandemic and CSC's commitment to follow Covid protocols. However, CSC found a way to connect with instructors and bring the team of lead instructors together each quarter through Google Classrooms. Stephanie Clewis at Sleeping Giant Middle School helped set-up Google Classrooms for every Cougar Club that was offered. The students registered through the Classrooms, and instructors were able to connect and communicate with their students directly through this virtual environment. In addition, each quarter a Lead Instructor specific Google Classroom page was set-up. This provided a pathway of communication between SGMS, CSC and the lead instructors. Lastly, a ZOOM orientation was led each quarter by Stephanie Clewis specifically for the lead instructors, where they were given important information about the Google Classroom environment, their clubs, discipline, icebreakers, evaluations and more.

THE FUTURE

During the upcoming 2021-2022 school year, CSC will continue to focus on designing and delivering programming for SGMS students, and we're looking forward to a return to larger-scale school events. The goal will be to provide students with enjoyable activities that enrich their education and increase their awareness of the opportunities and careers available to them in their community.

It takes a lot of work and a bit of money to produce fun and engaging activities safely and successfully. The 2021-2022 budget includes \$28,000 for operating and administrative expenses* and \$26,000 for program expenses**, with \$20,000 budgeted from grants and \$40,000 from individual donations. The remainder of our program expenses are covered by In-Kind volunteer hours and facilities that are donated by generous members of our community. These In-Kind donations are conservatively valued at \$60,000. As we look to the future and to the sustainability of the CSC program, a major goal is also to raise the funds required to employ a program manager. We are once again participating in the Park County Community Foundation's Give-a-Hoot Campaign that runs from 7/1/21 - 7/31/21. The funds raised will enable the CSC to continue to offer free, high quality programming to ALL SGMS students

CSC BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND BRIEF BIOSKETCHES

She worked in academia for 15 years and then focused on science policy for the Clinton Administration from 1993-1995.
